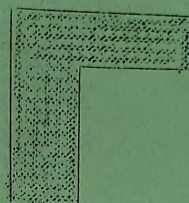
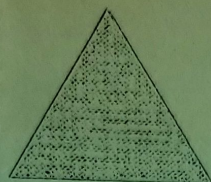

QUALIFICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP

From Basic Rulings and Interpretations
of Revised Constitution 1947-48
with 1952 amendments

1. Membership in the Delta Kappa Gamma Society is not based upon college work, degrees won, or scholastic honors alone. These things will neither admit nor debar persons from membership in the Society.
2. The Founders believe that the Society should be made up of leaders in the teaching profession known among their fellows as outstanding members of the profession, whether they be college, public school, or private school teachers, administrators, or other qualified educational workers.
3. Prospective members should possess the qualities of loyalty and personal honor, and should be active in the work of teacher organizations for the advancement of schools and the teaching profession.
4. Listed below are the specific personal and professional qualities recommended by the committee appointed some years ago to study qualifications for membership.
 - a. Skill in teaching
 - Knowledge of subject matter
 - Conscientious preparation of daily work
 - Resourcefulness
 - Sensitiveness to individual differences and needs
 - Ability to lead, direct, and inspire
 - Ability to secure class participation
 - Ability to evaluate results of teaching
 - Broad social view of education
 - b. Professional interest and growth
 - Attendance at professional meetings: local, state, national, others
 - Participation in programs
 - Reading professional literature
 - Contributing to professional magazines
 - Study: extension courses, correspondence, summer schools, long sessions, study groups
 - Willingness to participate in professional experiments and investigations
 - Respect for the teaching profession
 - c. Cooperation with and loyalty to the following:
 - Administration under which they work
 - Other teachers
 - The community in which they live
 - d. Personal and social qualities
 - Attractive personal appearance
 - Open-mindedness
 - Sense of responsibility
 - Sensitiveness to social proprieties
 - Personal magnetism
 - Proper appreciation of her own powers
 - Poise
 - Enthusiasm
 - Tact
 - Initiative

50 Youngsters Earn Right To "Junior Chef" Diplomas

Public Service Teen-Age Cookery Course Draws Even Younger Fry Who Cook, Like It

Fifty youngsters have earned diplomas entitling them to all the rights and privileges of "junior chefs".

They will receive the awards in cooking, after the last in a series of four classes conducted by Miss Fay Muzzy, of Public Service Electric and Gas Company. Exercises will be held in the auditorium of the Passaic office.

The two-week course in "Teen-Age Cookery" has drawn children, eight to 17 years old, from Clifton, Garfield, Wallington, Lodi and Nutley, as well as from Passaic.

Classes, which have been held Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, will end tomorrow.

Miss Muzzy taught her culinary-minded pupils how to prepare three square meals during the first three classes. Their last lesson should prove the most interesting to them, she says. Party-cake cakes and special desserts are on the teaching menu.

More than one-third of the class consists of boys (an invasion of the male invasion of man's realm).

Miss Muzzy has noted boys in class, especially the teenagers, are so enthusiastic, they constantly jot down notes on cooking methods.

When questioned about their interest in food preparation, they said they cook at home and like it.

Miss Muzzy first demonstrates how to cook foods, and then several students to try their hands at preparing the same dish.

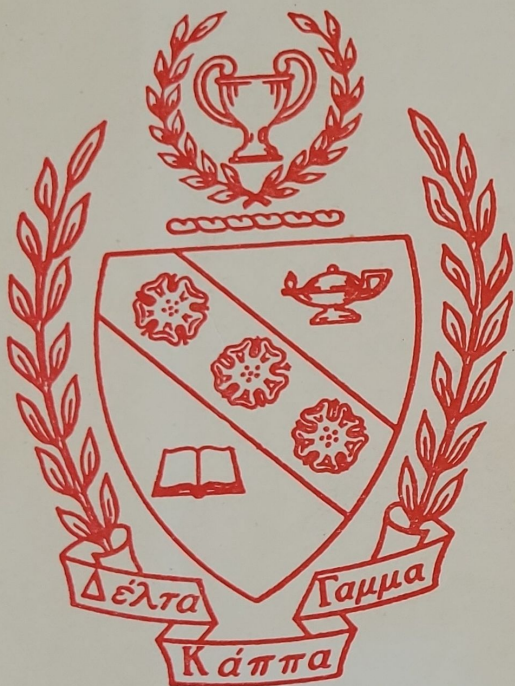
Finally every pupil gets a chance to do the actual cooking. In the first lesson, pointing up "breakfasts", was a demonstration on baking muffins, and

preparing fruits and juices. The second session dealt with quick lunches which included packed lunches, soups, grilled cheese sandwiches and pizza pies.

Yesterday they prepared a broiled dinner, a top-of-the-stove dish, and an oven meal.

After tomorrow's lesson, they should be a great help at home, says Miss Muzzy, who adds: "if they remember what I taught them".

They will—if their parents have anything to say about it.

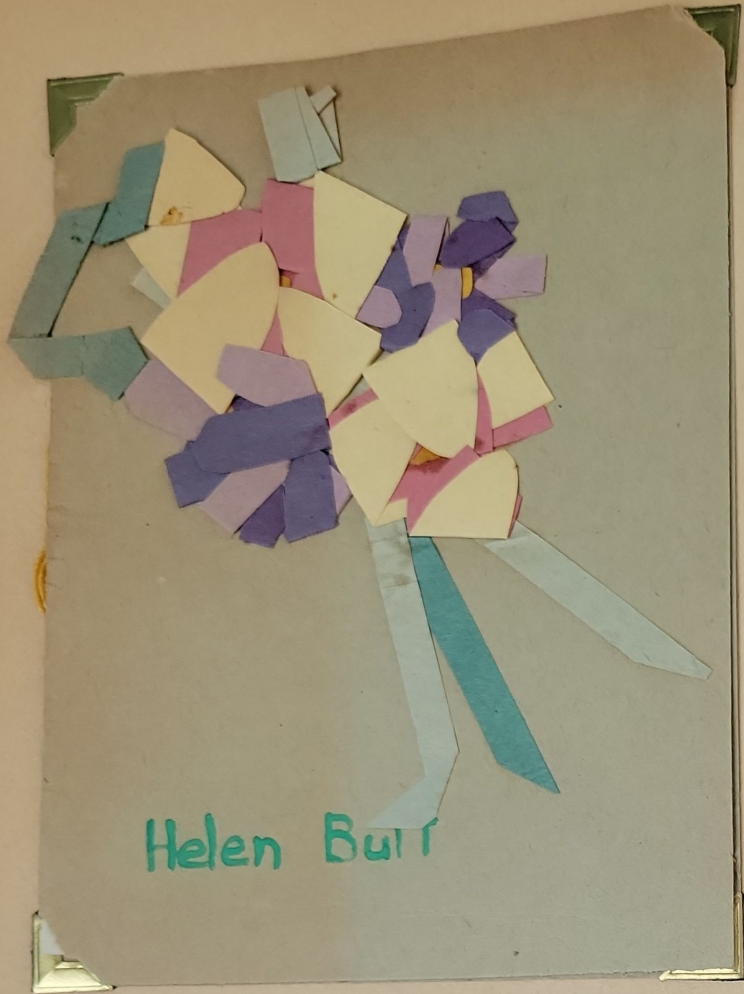

Panel discussion The Five M's,
Selective Recruitment

May 19-1956

Ch. One of the possible avenues of approach is the Cadet Teaching Program. Our research brought to light many interesting and worthwhile experiences, as, Indiana, West Orange, N.J., Schnectady, N.Y. and Danville, Illinois. We suggest that Delta Kappa Gamma members accept the responsibility of doing a little research on their own for possible implementation.

Now, ladies of the jury, you have heard the evidence. What is your decision? Here are our conclusions and we demand a reaction from you.

Mary (F.T.A.) 1. One sponsor reported that anything that can be done for F.T.A. Clubs to have an exchange locally of student and adult speakers would be greatly appreciated.
2. That each Delta Kappa Gamma member of the Alpha Chapter make an effort in the near future to bring the work of the F.T.A. before the community through the P.T.A. or any civic group.
3. Miss Lena Perreca, New Jersey's N.E.A. Director, attended the F.T.A. Workshop last weekend. Monday, I called Lena and told her about our program on Selective Recruitment and asked if she had any recommendations for a better program. Her reply was:
1. There should be a F.T.A. Club in every high school in N.J.
2. There should be a F.T.A. Chapter in every N.J. College.
3. There should be county meetings of F.T.A.
4. More scholarships available, and,
5. Our recruitment be selective.

Mildred I have no pat plan of action, but my conclusion is that organized action must be carried out as intelligently and self-fishly as the inspiration was given by individual teachers in the past.

Furthermore it is my conviction from my research that those of us who teach on the elementary school level should come up with a positive plan directed toward the encouragement of promising students to teach.

Mary Because we feel that teaching must be recognized as a profession and treated as such; we recommend that Alpha Chapter go on record as being opposed to any merit system of salary increases for teachers.
Because we feel that the need for teacher recruitment is both serious and urgent; we recommend that members of Alpha Chapter accept the challenge and work actively as possible in their home communities to initiate and coordinate efforts for the recruitment of potentially qualified young people for the teaching profession.

Marian 1. Delta Kappa Gamma teachers have an obligation to inform themselves on the various ways in which they can assist new teachers in the standardization of their certificates.
2. Alpha Chapter might go on record commending the State Board of Examiners for their part in holding the northeastern regional conferences on reciprocity problems.

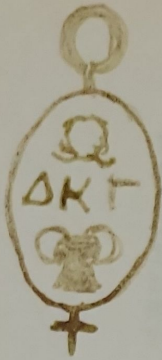
A meeting at Newark State Teachers College will be held March 18 and the state convention will be in Trenton, April 22-24.

September 29, 1956 William Pitt, Chatham, New Jersey.

*46" Irene Hapgood and Viola Stokes showed lovely pictures of their trip to New National Headquarters at Austin, Texas this summer; and told some of their experiences. Viola said that raising of dues to \$8.00 annually had been approved by a roll call vote.

Mildred Groder reported on the state executive board meeting held September 15 in Trenton. Several suggestions were given, among them the following:

1. That there be a transportation chairman in each area.
2. That the news-letter and three issues to be printed annually, contain a brief report of each program meeting sent to State headquarters.
3. That the chapter adopt exchange teachers in each area. (There are six in Alpha area.) We could invite two to each of the next three meetings.
4. That information of new chapters be discussed.

Mildred reported that New Jersey's gift to the National Headquarters Building was appropriately Lenox China, cost \$350, and the money was taken from the State Permanent Fund."

December 7, 1956 Suburban Hotel - East Orange, New Jersey.

Two guests, exchange teachers, Miss Marie Koomans, Rotterdam, Holland, and Miss Joan Tillie, England, were present.

*47"Congratulations were extended to Dorothy McConkey who has been honored in New York as head of the New York League For Speech Improvement."

*48" Hazel Gibson read a resolution to honor Mattie Doremus for her work as a great teacher and for her outstanding record as legislator."

"Marion Bedwell presented Fay Muzzy. Fay had as her topic, 'Christmas Around the World', and gave an interesting running comment, showing much research, as she showed her own colored slides of gourmet foods, mouth-watering, served as Christmas delicacies in various countries. She had no difficulty in selling later some samples of these foreign foods which she had prepared, the proceeds to go to the scholarship fund. Maria Koomans spoke briefly of 'Christmas in Holland' and Joan Tilley of the 'Yule Celebration in England'."

The main purpose of this meeting was to honor the Founders of Alpha Chapter - three were present - Frances Tibbits, Ruth Thomas, and Lillian Kane.

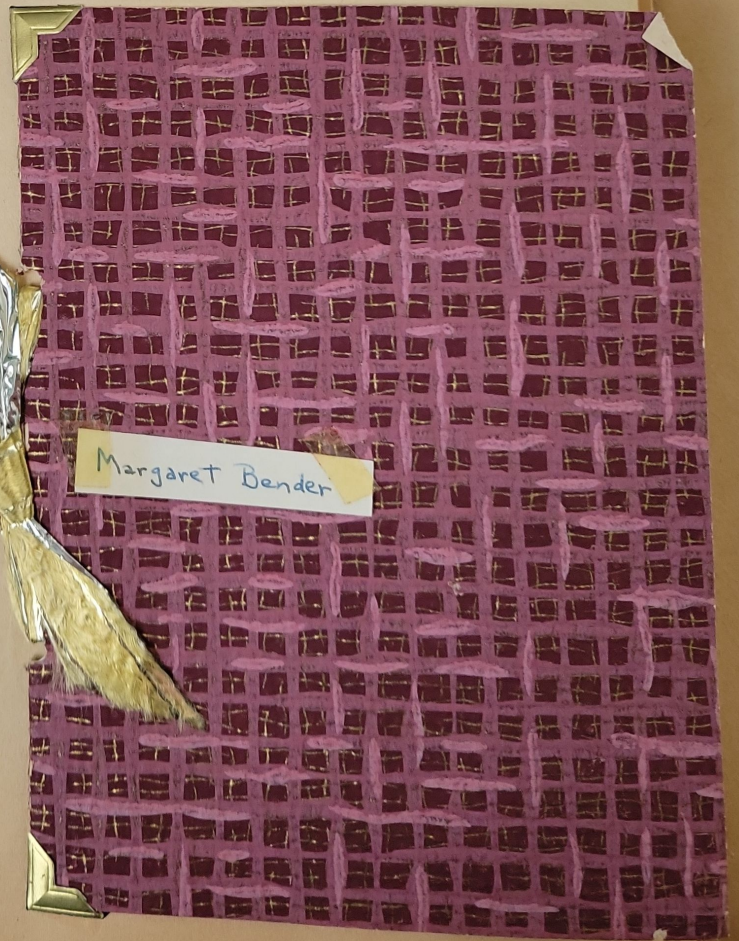
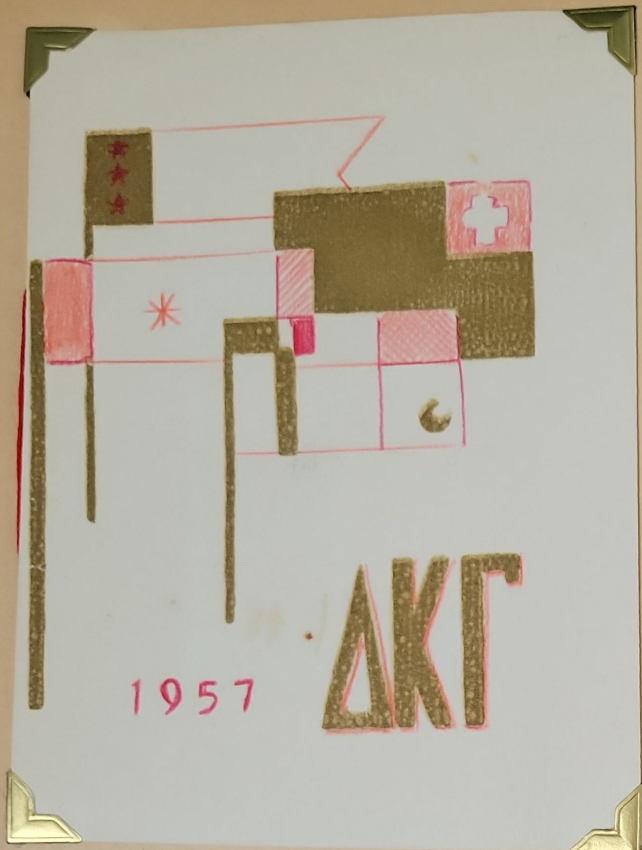
