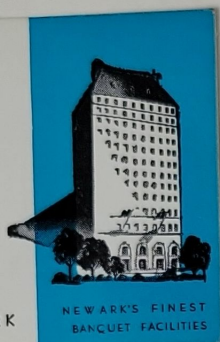

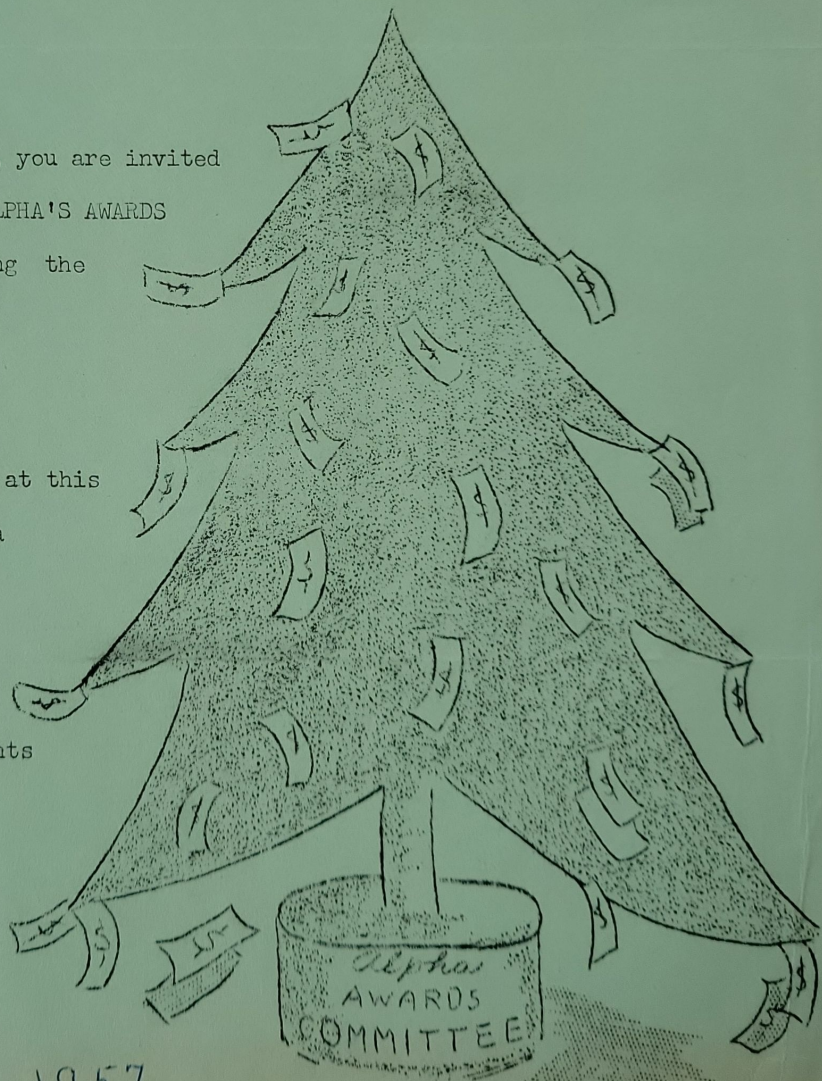

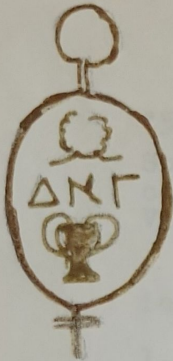

Katherine Sonne moved that an assessment of \$1.50 for each member be proposed at the regular October meeting. This motion was seconded by Sallie Glenn. It was passed. Nellie Hobday explained that there were ten life members and five associate members to be considered in financial reckoning.

In connection with the welfare of Alpha Chapter, a motion was made by Louise Vollmer to write the Passaic Board of Education commending them on the wise choice of Miss Reba Eaton for Principal of Passaic High School, and, Miss Irene Hapgood for Head of the Business Education Department. Dr. Vaughn-Eames compared some of the characteristics of education in the United States and in European countries. The greatest difference between foreign education and our system of training is exemplified in our work with the individual. There are still a number of problems to be met. - among them the consideration of the time element, of subject matter, of individual worth, and of the need to give teacher in training the concept of comprehending the overall picture.

Dr. June Guinnane, Associate Professor, Newark State College, opened her discussion with the question - "What is being done in high school in the way of guidance to find the proper college?"

The tantalizing question, "Who should go to college?" has not been satisfactorily answered to date. Statistics show that college drop outs are over fifty percent by the end of the sophomore year. The curricula problems were discussed, but no pat solutions were given.

Dr. Betty Linthicum, Assistant Professor of Science and Biology, Newark State College, spoke concerning "Modern Science and Industrial Development in Relation to Curriculum." Her talk was extremely interesting in that she presented some of the not-so-well-known facts concerning the impact of modern science and industrial development on education. A brief question period completed the program.

Distinguished for her work as International President of Delta Kappa Gamma, Margaret Boyd is equally well known for her labors in community affairs, in state and in the national education associations, in scholarship projects, and in work with overseas teachers.

Before she became International President of Delta Kappa Gamma, she served as Ohio state president, National Vice-President in 1948-50, co-chairman of Delta Kappa Gamma Silver Anniversary Fund and member of the National Building Committee.

Margaret Boyd brings a wealth of experience in education association work to her work in Delta Kappa Gamma. As president of a large state education association, a member of the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors of the NEA, and as chairman of two major policy making committees, the Resolutions and the International Relations Committee she has had unusual experience in meeting educational problems and working toward their solution.

Her work for her community has been equally outstanding. During her presidency of the Civic Service League this organization raised funds and opened the first Steubenville Cancer Clinic. She was instrumental in establishing Swing Haven, youth center, later serving several years on the board. She assisted in bringing the Community Chest to Steubenville, Ohio, and was active on the board during the first years. Working with the Welfare Department of the Steubenville Women's Club she assisted in opening the first class for mentally retarded children. She is serving on the Advisory Board for these classes which are not a part of the public school system in Steubenville.

As was to be expected from one having such a keen interest in education she has had special interest in scholarship projects. In 1928 as President of the Ohio Valley Pan Hellenic, she established the Ohio Valley Pan Hellenic Scholarship. Under this plan

Maria Sanford was the first woman professor on the staff of the University of Minnesota. Generations of students knew her as "the best loved woman in Minnesota." over twenty-five graduates of high schools in the Steubenville district have received their college education. As Chairman of the International Relations Committee, in the NEA, she was instrumental in raising over a half a million dollars to aid teachers in the war devastated lands. A considerable part of this was used to bring approximately 200 teachers to the United States to study, travel, and observe educational practices. During her presidency the Ohio Delta Kappa Gamma Overseas Scholarship (recently named the A. Margaret Boyd Scholarship) was developed. Under this five teachers from Greece, Germany, Norway, Iran, and Korea have had a year's study and travel in the U.S., and three American teachers have been sent to study abroad.

Margaret Boyd has held positions formerly held only by men. She was the first woman ever to be elected president of the Steubenville Education Association, the Eastern Ohio Teachers' Association, and the Ohio Education Association. She has, in fact, been the only woman elected to the Ohio Education Association in its 109 years of existence.

Alaska Offers Best in Education

Educational standards are high in Anchorage, according to Mrs. Agatha Prator of Alpha Chapter. While other sections of the U.S.A. complain of teacher shortage, hundreds are applying in Anchorage. The Board of Education chooses the best qualified and most enthusiastic, said Mrs. Prator.

A spirit of adventure and high salaries attract members of the profession. The salary for beginners is now \$6000 and one with a Master's degree receives \$8400. On the other hand food, rent, and utilities are high.

Just five years old, the multi-million dollar high school is used to capacity—running three shifts each school day. The senior high school convenes each morning from 6:30 to 12:30, junior high from 12:30 to 6:00, and the Community College from 6:30 to 11:00 at night.

The fine auditorium has 2000 opera seats and the stage, sets, lighting equipment are the best.

Music and art are also important to students and citizens alike in this growing Alaskan city. With a population of 35,000 and a metropolitan area of 65 to 70,000 indications are that growth may be limited only to the space between the inlet and the mountains.

Mrs. Prator has been in Alaska for nine years. Before her move to the Northland, she was active in Delta Kappa Gamma in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. Under her direction Alpha chapter was organized in Anchorage in 1955. She teaches in the high school and in private life is the wife of Mr. J. R. Prator, of the Department of the Interior.

The Czechoslovakian table, with Bernice Gestie as hostess, featured pictures of the medalions on the town clock in Prague. India, done by Marian Munson and her sister Alma Gasslander in authentic Indian costume, displayed royal elephants and a flame tree. Spanish dancers and figures from "Carmen" flanked a huge bouquet of flowers on Elsie Holt's table. Japan's table was decorated with tiny cherry blossoms, parasols and a pagoda by hostess Dorothy Nelson, who was an exchange teacher in Japan for two years.

Smorgasbord tables carried out the "Around the World" theme both in decorations and in types of food. Dominating the scene was a four foot globe of the world, backed by a sunburst of flags of all nations. Foods of Italian, Swedish, Hungarian, French, German, English, Japanese and Chinese origin were served.

international president, was called "Torte a la Margaret." Decorated with 3 lighted red tapers and one red rose, it was presented at the head table to Miss Boyd. Lois Powell led a group in singing a humorous ditty and later led the entire assemblage in an original musical game in which each was to guess the country represented by the song. As a gift for Miss Boyd herself, the four chairmen gave her a pair of Indian brass worship lamps.

Because this was to be strictly a "fun" night for pre-convention getting acquainted, there were no lengthy speeches. Introductions were performed by Leone Peters, the supper party chairman, and greetings were given by Virginia Grantham, Minnesota state president, Ivy Boyd, convention chairman, and Margaret Boyd, international president.

As a climax to the gala evening, the supper party committee presented as a gift for the headquarters building in Austin, Texas, a beautifully etched brass tray made in India.

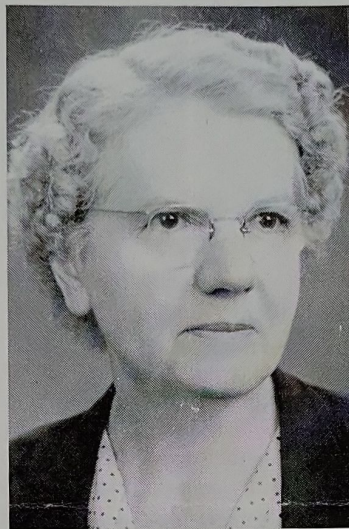
Miss Frances Finley, International First Vice-President, has been invited by President Margaret Boyd to serve as chairman of the Birthday Luncheon.

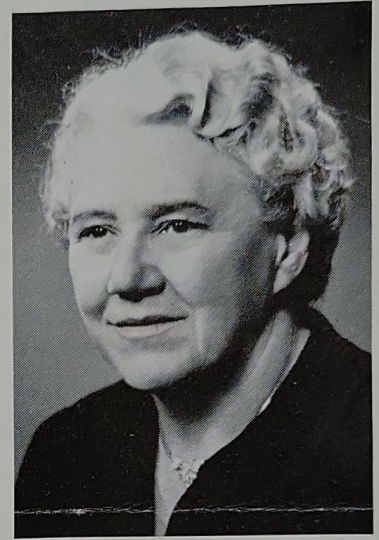
Her biggest accomplishment was handling the funds for the new home in Austin, Texas.

The accomplishments of the Legislative Committee for this year
are the result of the fine cooperation of the Chapter Legislative Chairman.

Accomplishments

- (a) Each chapter set up a telephone chain to inform members of legislative matters that were urgent.
- (b) Each chapter chairman read and studied the legislative material published in Educational Magazines - newspapers and the pamphlets.
- (c) Each chapter chairman
Wrote letters and sent telegrams
 - 1 - urging passage of bills
 - 2 - letters of thanks to legislators who promoted bills in which we were vitally interested
 - 3 - letters of thanks to N.J.E.A. - N.E.A. - P.T.A for their help in legislative matters.
- (d) Spoke before Lay Groups explaining bills before the legislature and asking their understanding help.
- (e) To encourage teachers to be interested in and be a part in the political scene.

DELTA KAPPA GAMMA SCHOLARSHIPS

April 1959

Every active and associate member is required by the International Constitution of Delta Kappa Gamma to pay an annual scholarship fee of \$1.00, this in addition to her \$7.00 annual dues. The only exception is a member who, before 1946, paid a life scholarship fee of \$10.00. (Life scholarships are no longer available.)

Of this \$1.00 scholarship fee, the allocation is as follows:

20¢ to the International Scholarship Fund

20¢ to the State Foundation Scholarship Fund

60¢ either to the Chapter Scholarship Fund or to the State Scholarship Fund.

STATE LEVEL SCHOLARSHIPS

The State Foundation Scholarship Fund is a permanent fund, the principal of which is to remain intact, but the interest or proceeds of which may be used for graduate scholarships.

The 60¢ may be retained by any chapter which maintains a chapter scholarship or it may be given to the State. The only stipulation is that no part of the moneys may be used for any purpose other than scholarships for graduate study by members of Delta Kappa Gamma.

When the New Jersey organization became large enough to divide into three chapters, each chapter decided that rather

than maintain a chapter scholarship, the 60¢ per member would be given to the State. The hope was that the accumulation of these 60¢'s from the three chapters would eventually amount to a sizable scholarship.

The total amount of money from the 60¢'s plus the interest on the 20¢'s that have gone into the Foundation Scholarship Fund is now a little more than \$2100. In accordance with the International Constitution, it is the responsibility of the State Scholarship Committee to submit recommendations for the approval of the State Executive Committee as to the use of this money.

Your State Scholarship Committee recommends that:

- I. Each year in which the Current Scholarship Fund equals or exceeds \$500, a scholarship of \$500 for graduate study be available to a member of Alpha Zeta State.

(With \$2100 available now in the Current Scholarship Fund, and an annual addition of a minimum of \$195 (60¢ x 325 present members), it will be possible to give \$500 each year from 1959 through 1963. By that time, our state-wide membership will have increased, but probably not up to the 837 necessary to insure an annual income of \$500. We might skip a year or so while the scholarship is building, or we might add to it in any way we choose beyond the 60¢.)

- II. The eligibility requirements of an applicant for the scholarship be as follows:
 - a. Applicants must be members of a Delta Kappa Gamma chapter in New Jersey.
 - b. Applicants must be doing graduate work in an approved institution of higher learning.
 - c. Applicants must meet reasonable standards as far as general health, personality, scholarship, professional services and other evidence of potentialities for future service are concerned.

(These are the first three requirements for an International Scholarship.)

- III. Applications must be received by the state scholarship chairman not later than April 1, except during 1959 when they must be received by May 15.

ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS, PRIZES, ETC.
ON THE STATE LEVEL

According to the International Constitution, in addition (to the Scholarship already described), a State Committee on Scholarships may award such local scholarships and prizes as their respective organizations determine. It is in accordance with this that, at the State Executive Committee meeting in February, 1957, it was voted to give the \$25 award annually to the most promising senior girl in each of New Jersey's State Colleges. Emphasis should be placed on this award as a recognition of promising "teachership." Each chapter was given two specific colleges, the seventh, Newark, to be taken care of by the State Scholarship chairman and the source of the \$25 to be provided statewide. Last year, 1958, was the first time the award was made to Newark, and it was voted to take the \$25 for this purpose from the State General Fund. Since that time, the generous return of the \$50 Convention expense money by the State president who gave the money with the specific stipulation that it be used for awards, takes care of the Newark award for two years to come.

There seems to have been some misunderstanding concerning the awards; this comes from confusing a "scholarship" with an award in recognition of excellence in teaching potentiality. Our award is on a par with recognizing the valedictorian of a class, the \$25 being our form of recognition rather than a

certificate or a medal.

Since this type of award has been established by a vote of the State Executive Committee, it is, of course, binding on all chapters until such time as it is rescinded.

INTERNATIONAL LEVAL SCHOLARSHIPS

I. Annual Scholarships

There are three of these, each worth \$2500 and available for graduate study by any qualified member of Delta Kappa Gamma.

Applications must be received by the International Scholarship Committee by January 1. For applications and qualifications, contact your State Scholarship Chairman.

II. Special Scholarships

There are fifty-five of these scholarships, \$2500 each, one to each state, to be awarded at the 1960 International Convention.

The money for these scholarships will be provided by a contribution of \$2 per member on the basis of membership on January 1, 1960 (active, associate, reserve, and honorary).

This \$2 per member is in addition to the \$7 annual dues and the regular \$1 scholarship dues.

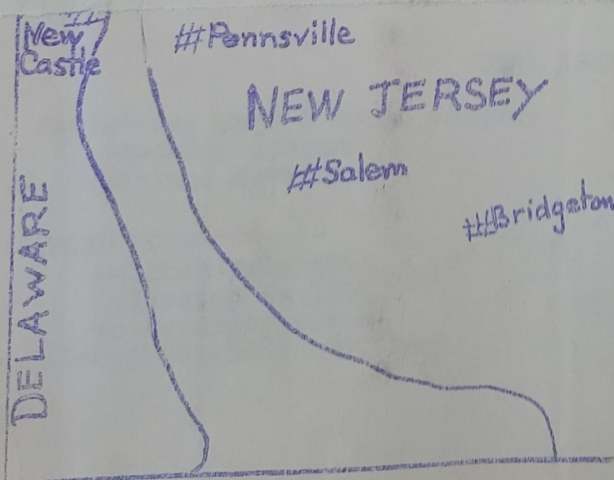

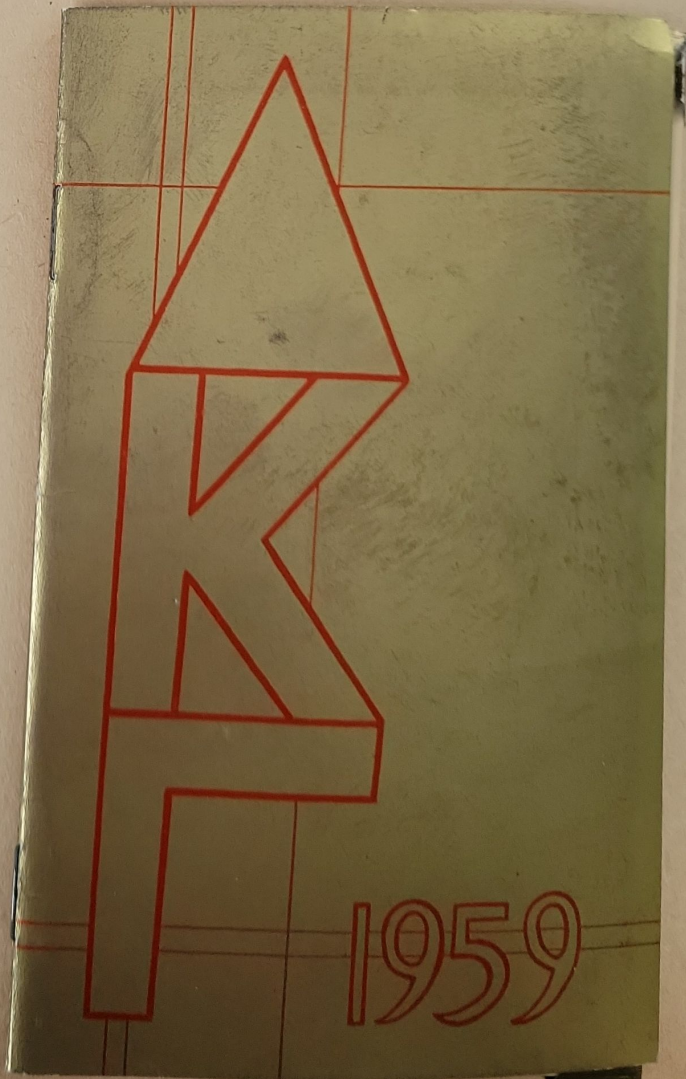

Romania Princess Raps Free World On Promises

Exiled Princess Ileana of Romania Monday night chastised the United States and the free world for failing to keep promises of political independence made to her country at the end of the war.

She spoke at an evening session of the opening day of a three-day meeting being held in the Hotel Statler - Hilton by Delta Kappa Gamma, a national honor society for women in education.

500 Attend
Five hundred members attended the evening session and heard Princess Ileana tell them that Communist propaganda fed her people "is coming true."

She spoke of Red propaganda which tells the enslaved people behind the Iron Curtain that the

people of the free world will not make the personal sacrifice necessary to bring freedom to the satellite countries once again.

The princess said the fundamental difference between East and West is the East's atheism. Because of the denial of God, she said, the Communists automatically denied the people the right of free choice.

Only when the citizens of the free world make known a desire to sacrifice will the politicians and diplomats make progress in the fight against Soviet aggressions, she said.

The conference will continue today and Wednesday with a series of workshops for society committees and chapter officers.

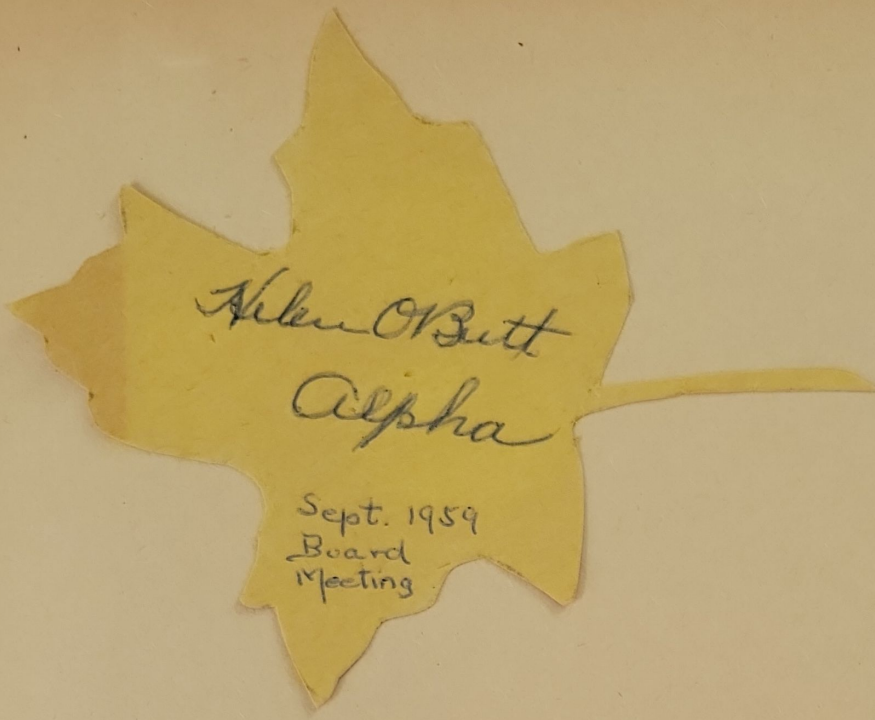
